

MEET THE NEW BATTALION CHIEFS



Battalion Chief of Operations Jeff Brown A-shift

How long have you been with the organization? I started as a volunteer in 1997 and hired as a full-time firefighter in February of 1999.

Tell me about how you got into your line of work? I was a deputy with Elbert County Sheriff's Office. After seven years, I needed a career change. I wanted to stay in public service, but I wanted a branch of service that shared my same values and priorities. I worked many calls with Elizabeth Fire, and I saw how the members were a team. As a volunteer agency, they were committed to their work. They trained together regularly, and above all, they were dedicated to their community. These were all qualities that I envied and wanted to be a part of the greatness. So I had lunch with Chief Steck and a prior training captain, and the rest is history.

What lessons has your work life taught you? There is a lesson to learn here regularly. I have learned that the fire service is susceptible to fads like everywhere else and more. A new technique, new matrix, or new buzzword comes around all the time. We tend to spend a significant amount of time and effort focusing on them. I have learned that our industry certainly changes, but our job comes down to a few simple tasks and concepts. You maintain a solid work ethic, have a sharp focus on the basics of firefighting, and a personal commitment to provide the best service to your customers. You are probably going to end up as a fine firefighter.

What is your favorite thing about your career? A man who lived in the District was highly influential in my life; his son-in-law was my closest friend. While responding to the man's house several times while he was dying, I spent quite a few hours with his son-in-law. At the man's funeral, my friend asked me how I do this job in the same place I live? How do I go to people's homes where there is a chance I would know them during such a difficult time? I told him I had thought about this many times. If this were my family going through a difficult time, I would want a friend. A person that my family and I trusted to be there to lean on. I have always felt honored being that person in the worst of times. We have a quote above one of our doors that says:

"Today, you have the honor of providing assistance in a time of need." I truly believe in that.

What would be your personal motto? If you ask my kids, they will give you a bunch that I've preached to them over the years. However, I recently listened to a leadership conference and heard a Chief mention a motto that resonates with me currently. "Never walk by a problem that you can solve."





Battalion Chief of Training Nick Carnesi B-shift

How long have you been with the organization? 17 Years

Tell me about how you got into your line of work. I went through the reserve fire academy at Elizabeth Fire with the intention to become a volunteer firefighter in my spare time. I had a great career in the corporate world, but it didn't take long for me to realize that the fire service was a good fit for me. I volunteered at Elizabeth Fire for 4 years before being offered a full-time position.

What lessons has your work life taught you? It sounds cliche, but I've learned that life is short, and nothing is guaranteed. Appreciate little things and make memories.

What is your favorite thing about your career? I have to opportunity to serve the community that I grew up in. I get to interact with people who I knew in school, their parents, and even their children. People often call on us when they are having the worst day of their lives, and sometimes seeing a familiar face can reduce the stress of their situation.

What would be your personal motto? It makes much more sense, to live in the present tense.

What would be your personal motto? Trust is the hardest thing to gain and easiest to lose.








ORGANIZATIONAL CHART_





2020 Still a busy year for new construction around the District and the pandemic did not affect the growth in the District.











2021 BUDGETED EXPENSES


